#### Article from Your INCCC Representative

fter forty-one years of and proper inflation can all faithful service, my Posi-Traction Torque Twister tires have finally begun to fail. While Janice and I were enjoying last fall's "Just Park It" tour just outside of Springdale, we heard that unmistakable "thump, thump, thump" sound from the failing left front tire. Jan said my face turned pale (I was inwardly contemplating having to replace my car's beloved bias ply mid-seventies meats, the tires that defined my low-buck youth's attempt to make my ride look faster). We limped home and I jacked up the left front of the car to see what was going on. Although the sidewall still looked unchecked and fresh, hell, there were even those little black molding things (sprues) sticking out of them, the areas between the treads was showing deep cracks. And, then there was that raised bulge, mid-tread, and about the size of a silver dollar on that left front doughnut. Clearly, my 1975 tires were ready to be put out to pasture.

So to be on the safe side, when should you replace your pride and joy's tires, arguably one of the pricier auto maintenance expenses? Tread wear, heat, cold, driving habits, factor in to dictate a tire's expected lifespan.



Most tire manufactures now say that the rubber in tires deteriorates over time and that tires should be replaced after six years and possibly up to ten years if you conduct annual inspections. And then there

are those other factors, tread wear, heat, cold, driving habits, and proper inflation. Let's look at each one.

Tread wear is what most of us use to gauge when a tire should be replaced. When a tire's wear bars finally contact the road surface, your tread is worn down to just 2/32 of an inch. Remember when we used to put a Lincoln penny in the tread and look to see if the top of Abe's 'do could be seen? Tire experts tell us that we should instead be using a tread gauge and measuring at least 4/32 of an inch to stave (Continued on page 5)

off the possibility of dangerous hydroplaning while driving in rain. A quarter placed in the tread should not show the top of George Washington's grape in order to be on the safe side. All season radials should show a tread depth of at least 6/32 of an inch for safe driving.

Heat: Heat can cause a tire to deteriorate faster than anything and its effects on tires are made even worse if you live in a coastal area when salt is also factored in. Along with heat, UV from sunlight and ozone exposure also cause rubber to break down in the tire's sidewalls. That's why we see early sidewall checking on cars that are often parked outside and left in the elements. Think about that brand new unused spare tire in the trunk. It's never even been on the ground. Should

be good indefinitely, right? Not necessarily, as it's been baking on "high" in your car's trunk oven every hot summer and freezing in the winter. We do "enjoy" temperature extremes in our Inland Empire home. Constant climate variations of hot summer heat and below freezing cold takes it toll on your tires rubber and increases its eventual breakdown and failure.

Maintaining proper tire inflation is key in keeping your tires happy and long lived. Low tire pressure can lead to increased heat, outside edge tread wear and sidewall checking. Over inflation will cause the center of your tire's tread pattern to unevenly wear and will also make for a hard, bumpy ride when hitting Spokane's less than smooth road surfaces. Remember, hot weather increases your tire pressure and cold decreases it so you

have to stay on top of inflation. Check your car's tire inflation at least monthly and before taking road trips. Look for proper inflation numbers on the your tire's sidewall, in your vehicle's owners manual, or on the driver's side door jamb.

Finally, our personal driving habits can lead to early tire failure. Driving on uneven surfaces, over rail crossings, kissing curbs while cornering, scraping the sidewalls while parking, these driving habits all have a negative impact on your vehicle's tire health and longevity.

Notice, I didn't mention burning rubber, fast cornering, and skidding to a stop. None of us would ever think to do those sorts of things.

## Washington State Reintroduces Bill to Provide for Single License Plate

#### **DON'T DELAY!** Please request support for H.B. 2419 immediately from the Washington House Transportation Committee

 H.B. 2419 provides that any vehicle originally manufactured without an installed bracket, device, or other means to display and secure a license plate on the front of the vehicle, and registered in an area near a toll facility that does not allow the manual payment of tolls, may be required to purchase and use a "Good to Go!" pass.

- H.B. 2419 would protect the aesthetic contours of certain vehicles and relieve vehicle owners of the burden and expense of having to create mounting holes on some original bumpers.
- H.B. 2419 would save money, conserve resources and bring Washington in line with other states that are moving to a single plate requirement.
- H.B. 2419, if enacted into law, would take effect on July 1, 2017.

**Overview:** Legislation (H.B. 2419) has been introduced in the Washington State House of Representatives to allow the issuance of only a single rearmounted license plate for vehicles originally manufactured without an installed bracket, device, or other means to display and secure a license plate on the front of the vehicle.





### This Colorado Parts Yard has been Collecting Classic Cars for Decades.

bright orange Ford pickup sits wrapped around a tree. The truck dips in the center from the force of impact, its headlights shoved around either side of its arboreus lover. Surprise though! The tree embraced by 1978 chrome isn't the one that did the damage. Automotive artists Gary and Alice Corns sat the crumpled Ford against the tree in their wrecking yard as a visual joke, and visitors to Colorado Auto and Parts enjoyed it so much that it's become a permanent installation. "We moved it once and people asked us where it was, so we had to put it back," said company president Alice Corns. It's just one of the quirky



presentations you'll find in in the parts yard's 38-acre recycling facility.

Alice Corns' parents started the auto recycling business in 1959. "Back then it was called a wrecking yard or junkyard," she told us, "but now I get mad at my kids for calling it a junkyard. They still do though." With that in mind, we'll go with wrecking yard for the rest of this post, but bear in mind that the Corns' business involves much more than simply crushing metal. The majority of the land is a selfservice parts yard, like it was when Alice's dad ran the business, but there's a section to the side that will blow your mind. See. Papa Corns was a car collector, and when an interesting classic or muscle car came in during the 40 or so years that he ran the place, he'd stick it off to the side. He restored some, but most just sat there. "I don't really know why he kept them," said Alice. "Maybe just to say he had them?"

About a decade ago Alice and Gary moved all the classics out of the selfservice yard. "People will destroy a perfect door to get a door handle," she said. "We didn't know what we were going to do with the cars, but we knew we didn't want them crushed."



new homes for the Mustangs, Chryslers, Buicks, Lincolns, and Caddys you'll see in these photos. "There's no reason for these cars to sit," said Alice. "If someone buys them or the parts, they can get a brandnew life. I'm pretty big on recycle, renew, and reuse, and making old cars into hot rods and customs, that is recycling."
