

## Mid-engined Corvette's LT7 twin-turbo V8 leaks in CAD drawing

Corvette Forum has scored three coups in the past month concerning Chevrolet's next-generation sports car. The latest leak is a CAD drawing of a longitudinal, DOHC, twin-turbo V8 that could be one of the three rumored powerplants sliding into the mid-engine 'Vette's engine bay. In an earlier leak, a detail showing the V8's turbocharger came labeled as "Gen6 LT7," leading sleuths to believe this is the sixth-generation of GM's small-block V8 architecture, dubbed LT7.

As gearhead tweeter Bozi Tatarevic pointed out, the illustrated V8 drawing shares cues with the 3.0-liter, TT V6 LGW engine used in the Cadillac CT6, such as turbocharger placement and belt configuration. The turbos hang on the sides of the engine instead of lying in the V between the cylinder banks, with plumbing running from the turbos up to water-to-air intercoolers atop the banks. That feature is, again, the same as on the Cadillac TT V6. Also of note, it appears as if the exhaust manifolds are cast into the cylinder heads. We can't figure out displacement, but one of the recent



Corvette leaks laid out a plan for three V8 engines: the current 6.2-liter V8, and two DOHC twin-turbo V8s, one 4.2 liters, the other 5.5-liters.

We await the reveal of the new coupe and some certifiable information at next month's Detroit Auto Show. Until then, if you want a deep dive of CSI-like sleuthing, other leaked images like the rear fascia, past predictions, and more tangents than geometry class, members at Corvette forum have thoroughly chewed through all the leaks.

## Camaro SS Confirmed As Holden's Halo Car In 2018

With the shuttering of Hold- liter V8 under the hood en factories in Australia, the good for 455 horsepower subsidiary GM-owned looking for a way to retain. \$80,000 AUD (approximately \$62.675 USD), the new Camaro won't come cheap. For reference, the base 2.3-liter EcoBoost Mustang starts at \$44,990 AUD (\$57,425 USD), while the V8-powered Mustang GT can be had for \$57,490 AUD (\$73,380 USD) with an automatic gearbox. Given the \$20,000-plus premium for the Camaro, the be direct rivals in the region, says GM.

Chevy and HSV hope to sell up to 1,000 converted Camaros per year in Australia,

which is the same number, ironically, that Ford had originally estimated when it first shipped over the Mustang. Already in 2017, Ford has sold an impressive 6,700 examples in the region, a relative drop in the bucket to the more than 56,000 examples the Blue Oval has moved in the U.S. this year. HSV has confirmed that the new Camaro will be the star of the lineup when it arrives in late 2018, replacing the Commodore range. The last HSV-tuned Commodores that will roll off the line will be either the GTSR or the W1, and are expected to make their debut in December.

### Ingredients


1 tablespoon olive oil 1 large onion, chopped 4 cloves garlic, minced 1 (10 ounce) package frozen bell pepper strips black pepper to taste 1 cup sweet white corn 1 (16 ounce) jar medium-hot salsa 1 teaspoon chili powder 2 (15 ounce) cans no-salt-added black beans, drained 1 (15 ounce) can black-eyed peas, rinsed and drained 1 (10.5 ounce) can chicken stock 1 cube chicken bouillon 3 cups water 1/2 cup uncooked long grain rice

## Directions

1 Heat the olive oil in a deep pot over medium-high heat. Stir in the onion, garlic, and bell peppers; cook until onions are transparent and peppers are soft, about 10 minutes. Season to taste with black pepper. Stir in the corn, salsa, chili powder, black beans, black-eyed peas, chicken stock, chicken bouillon cube, water, and rice. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat to medium and simmer at least 30 minutes until the rice is tender.



## Tested: Can Engine Oil Really Last 20,000 Miles?
