


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
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Comanchero's Car Show in Pinehurst, ID





2019 Ford GT Heritage Edition Wears Famed Gulf Livery



Ford is debuting yet another GT Heritage Edition to pay tribute to the GT40s that swept Le Mans from 1966 to 1969. This model wears the famous Gulf Oil livery and comes with unique interior appointments that honor Ford's racing past. Owners have already started painting their GTs in Gulf colors, but this is the first new Ford GT to get the iconic livery from the factory.

the Heritage Edition features exposed carbon-fiber A-pillars. Silver mirror caps, 20-inch highgloss dark gray wheels, and orange Brembo brake calipers finish off the exterior.

Ebony Inside. you'll find Alcantara materials as well as blue and contrast orange stitching. There are dark stainless appliques accenting the instrument panel and other areas, while the door sills are accented in exposed matte carbon fiber. The seats have been to resemble embossed the original 1968 Le Mans-winning Like other car. Heritage Editions, this model features a unique identification plaque.

Ford will offer this special edition for two years. It will be available in limited quantities, of as Ford has course. only committed to making 1,000 total copies of the GT.

Buyers can opt for a package that adds exposed carbon-fiber roundels on the exterior and interior. Model-vear 2019vehicles will receive No. 9 graphics on the hood and doors, while 2020 models will get No. 6 graphics, honoring the same car that won Le Mans in 1969 with a different number.

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Prickly Pear Limeade

Prep

"A refreshing limeade with a unique twist. Prickly pears are now being considered as another 'superfood' with many health benefits. They can be found in various colors-red, green, yellow, and orange. One great way to enjoy this fruit is in this minty limeade. Serve cold and over ice."

Ingredients

12 prickly pears 2 cups water 1/4 cup freshly squeezed lime juice 1 1/2 tablespoons stevia sweetener (such as Truvia(R)) 4 fresh mint leaves, or more to taste ice cubes

Directions

- 1 Cut prickly pears in half lengthwise and scoop out flesh with a spoon. Process in a blender until smooth. Push pulp through a fine mesh strainer to extract about 1 1/2 cups juice. Discard pulp.
- 2 Place prickly pear juice, water, lime juice, stevia, and mint in a blender. Blend until smooth. Pour into two 16-ounce glasses filled with ice.
