

The Life of Jim's 1964 Chevelle Malibu SS

General Motors in Van Nuys, CA, November 1963 – the birthplace of this beautiful Chevrolet Chevelle. The original owner purchased the car from Buchanan Chevrolet right here in Spokane, WA. One sad night, thieves ran rampant and stole the car. They managed to strip out the engine and transmission before law enforcement was able to recover and return it to its distraught owner. In 1971, Jim Earlscourt purchased her for a paltry \$135.

From there, Jim built a hiperformance engine, Muncie M-22 four-speed transmission, GM twelve-bolt rear end. Would you believe he acquired a variety of tickets?

In 1988, Jim gave the car to his son who then painted the car with "Corvette Hugger Orange". He removed unnecessary weight, installed a "big block" racing engine, and entered the drag racing arena. After blowing the



engine, he decided to store the car in a farmer's barn while he traveled the country with NHRA drag racing teams as a mechanic.

Shortly after returning home to Spokane, tragedy struck. Jim's son died in a car accident. The



Chevelle remained in storage for 15 years.

Fast forward now to 2015. It was time to bring the car back to Jim brought her out of life. storage and proceeded to get down to business. He chose to preserve the paint and character of the car without doing a frame off restoration. Being an outdoor Jim did type person, the complete task outdoors, in fair weather conditions, over the course of the next four years. He never used a garage except for winter storage.

The restoration has included new wiring, body parts, drive train

and exhaust system, interior... He has also removed & repainted the dash and related parts black to improve color contrast. Other work performed on this car includes the door trim: customizing the trunk; removing dings and dents; touching up rock chips; color sanding and buffing; replacing side moldings, replacing the windshield; and finally installing the correct fourspeed console.

New Year Black Eyed Peas

Prep 20 m

Cook 3 h Ready In 11 h 20 m

Recipe By: MAYAESR

"A delicious New Year's Eve recipe to bring you luck in the new year! I so use the ham bone and some of the surrounding meat from the tradition ham that I make each year, but the ham hocks also add a nice, smokey, r their own."

Ingredients

1 pound dry black-eyed peas 2 tablespoons olive oil 1 large yellow onion, diced 2 cloves garlic, minced 2 (32 ounce) cartons chicken broth 8 cups water 1 pound smoked ham hocks 1 (14.5 ounce) can diced tom 5 pepperoncini peppers 1 bay leaf 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder 1/4 teaspoon ground thyme salt and pepper to taste

Directions

- 1 Place the black-eyed peas into a large container and cover with several inches of cool water; let stand 8 hours to overnight. Drain and rinse before using.
- 2 In a large stock pot over medium heat, cook and stir onion and garlic in olive oil until onion becomes translucent, about 5 minutes. Pour in the chicken broth and 8 cups water, bring to a boil, and reduce heat to a simmer. Stir in soaked black-eyed peas, ham hocks, tomatoes, pepperoncini, bay leaf, garlic powder, thyme, and salt and pepper. Cover and simmer until peas are tender, ham meat is falling off the bones, and the broth is thickened, about 3 hours.

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Truck Carrying Ford Mustang Shelby GT500 Cars Flips on Freeway

- A car carrier rolled over onto its side on I-75 near Detroit today with two 2020 Ford Mustang Shelby GT500 cars on the trailer, according to a report by Fox 2 Detroit.
- The news site said all northbound lanes were closed while the vehicles and the car carrier were rescued, and no injuries were reported.
- The cars appear damaged but not destroyed based on this far-away photo Fox 2 took from a helicopter.

Detroit news station Fox 2 reported this afternoon that a truck pulling a car trailer flipped



onto its side on I-75 in downtown Detroit today. This is of interest because the cars on the trailer were a pair of new 2020 Ford Mustang Shelby GT500 cars—in Iconic Silver and Grabber Lime presumably on their way to their lucky new owners. The semi also made contact with a heavy-duty Ford pickup in the accident, the video shows.

The truck sat on its side, and

northbound traffic was stopped in all lanes for several hours, while arrangements were made to rescue the GT500s and take them away on flatbed trucks. We're betting this is not the last hairy escape either of these cars will have on a roadway in their lives.
