Del grew up in a family on the move. dad His was in construction and his jobs took him and his family all over the county. For a time, Del lived in Grangeville, Idaho where he began modeling his building military ships and airplanes when he was in the third grade. Unfortunately, his younger siblings found

When the family finally settled more permanently, Del became fascinated by huge the trains moving open cargo loads of new cars, lumber and other commerce past his home. Before long Del began learning skills needed to create his amazing depictions of real life in miniature. Peach Cobbler Cheesecake Bars

Peach cobbler and cheesecake is an extraordinary combination. The peaches are bursting with sweet, fresh flavor, and the cheesecake filling is creamy and luscious. Together, they are divine!

Servings: 24 Yield: 24 bars



Ingredients

cooking spray

Crust

1 (8 ounce) package refrigerated crescent roll dough (such as Pillsbury*

1/2 cup peach preserves

Filling:

12 ounces Neufchatel cheese, softened

1/2 cup white sugar

2 eggs, lightly beaten

1 teaspoon almond extract

3 large fresh peaches - peeled, pitted, and sliced

Topping:

11/2 cups all-purpose flour

¼ cup brown sugar

1/4 cup white sugar

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

¼ teaspoon salt

1/2 cup melted unsalted butter

Directions

Step 1

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Spray a 9x13-inch baking pan with cooking spray.

Step 2

Separate crescent dough into 2 rectangles and place in the bottom of the prepared pan, forming the crust. Press dough to cover the bottom of the pan, sealing perforations. Spread peach preserves on top of dough.

Step 3

Place Neufchatel cheese, sugar, eggs, and almond extract in a large bowl. Beat using an electric mixer on high speed until smooth. Spread mixture evenly over preserve-covered dough. Place peach slices on top.

Step 4

Whisk flour, brown sugar, white sugar, cinnamon, and salt together in a small bowl. Pour melted butter over mixture and stir using a fork until you have coarse crumbs. Sprinkle crumb topping over peaches.

Sten 5

Bake in the preheated oven until golden and firm, about 40 minutes. Remove from the oven and let cool completely before cutting into bars, about 30 minutes. Serve warm or chilled.

Cook's Notes:

You may use regular cream cheese instead of the reduced-fat Neufchatel. You can use peach jam instead of preserves, if you'd like.

Tip:

The cream cheese filling will firm up as it cools. To make the bars even easier to cut, refrigerate for an hour before cutting.

As a member of the model railroading club, Del has produced a number of notable modules. One of these included an accurate rendition of the Hershy Chocolate factory in Hershy

Pennsylvania. The large factory is lighted, has real from smoke coming its numerous smokestacks and the smell of chocolate surrounds the model. Del uses part of a crockpot and an old computer cooling fan mounted under the module to produce and distribute the chocolate aroma for delighted onlookers. When the Hershy diorama is on full display, a Hershy train rolls by and stops in front of mesmérized kids and adults who are then invited to take Hershy kisses from the train's gondola cars. Another of Del's popular dioramas is of an outdoor drive in theater. The drive in's liahted marque announces "American Graffiti" and "Two-Lane Blacktop" as the evening's offerings and those can be seen actually

playing on the drive in's miniature led screen. A beam of light even shines toward the screen from a tiny projection booth.

Visitors to this year's Speed and Custom Show saw Del's incredibly detailed drag strip module complete with lights and sound. One can spend the better part of an hour looking at this module and still miss some of the tiny details Del's imagination and craft skills have created. Two '60s era slingshot railers scream down the quarter-mile while a scale '55 Chevrolet and '56 Lincoln Continental stage for their run. A little further back, two '58 Ford Fairlanes have their rear opening hoods vertical as drivers make their adjustments before their time

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on the track. And all of this is taking place on just one small segment of the module. So much to see and so well done.



The aforementioned "Dick's Drive In" diorama is a faithfully accurate depiction of the Spokane fast food icon. Del created his miniature using parts from a number of

building kits and many hand made pieces. It's all there, the original "Panda" sign, the parking lot, picnic tables, separate office building in the back, even seagulls on the roof begging for fries. And if you look closely, a man is seen holding a sign and panhandling on the corner of third and Browne.



Such are the modeling talents of the Gents Auto Club's Del Skobalski. The next time you're at one of our local car shows, look for that little powder blue 1928 Chevrolet miniature diorama with a radiator perched on its supports. Chances are you'll see yet another of Del's amazing creations. And if you ask, he'll tell you he still has that first train he bought so many years ago in Campbell's Soup livery.

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
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
