Greetings my fellow Gents! I hope everyone had a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New


Year.


In September of 2001, Steve and his wife Vicki purchased Five Mile Auto. Rod's vision by then had grown exponentially. Rod

In addition to weekly meetings, we made good use of the building as a place to rendezvous before our Saturday night cruising of Riverside Avenue in downtown Spokane. Other spots where you would find us were Bakers Beacon on Division, Triple XXX Root Beer on Sprague, Top Hat Drive-In on Sprague, Joe's Pizza near West Valley on Trent, the A & W in Dishman, and Ron's Drive-In on East Sprague.

During Drag Race season the club members participated at the Deer Park Drag Strip on Sundays for grudge racing and various class racing. Some of us even won trophies and all of us had a great time at the strip. By the time we were seniors at West Valley, the club had grown to 30 or 40 active members and had become well known throughout Spokane. and Steve had worked together for years, planning and making it work - building a business by fixing all makes and models of customer's cars, selling parts, and specializing in performance parts.


The Youth are Gonna be Fine
